Dear Colleagues in Ministry,

I recently attended a Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Remembrance Service coordinated by Captain Rick Gates, Command Chaplain at NAWCAD, Patuxent River, MD. I was greatly impressed by the quality of this remarkable service with its extraordinary video and slide presentations, sense of God's presence and numerous participants. I was most impressed with the diverse composition of the participants: all races, creeds and colors took part. The chaplains, Religious Program Specialists and other program organizers showed how a creative team develops and promotes an inclusive remembrance ceremony attended and appreciated by a diverse group of Americans.

Recently, Rear Admiral Lou Iasiello, Deputy Chief of Chaplains & Chaplain of the Marine Corps, sent the following message to chaplains and Religious Program Specialists serving with Marines. It clearly communicates our Chaplain Corps' mandate to "care for all" Sea Services members and their families. Chaplain Iasiello writes:

As...spiritual leaders, I encourage you to celebrate this diversity with the People of God, the community that God has entrusted to your care. I urge you to stand at the center of our Nation's many cultural, racial, and creedal traditions with hands outstretched to apparent opposites... to become God's conduits for new communal growth and enlightenment. God has given us a great gift in our diversity; let us celebrate it together.

Thank you for giving so much of yourself in service to God and Country. The innovative, life transforming service you so selflessly provide to our Nation's young men and women, contributes significantly to their quality of life and to making America an even better Nation. God Bless You!
