This proverb was proven true once again as your Chaplain Corps and Religious Program Specialist Senior Leaders met in Orlando last week at the Senior Leadership Conference, 2002. 2. **Remember who you are** - Continually remembering we are God's children will motivate us to live worthy of that honor, ensuring that the shield of divine favor surrounds us.
3. **Live the Chaplain Corps vision and mission** - These place us on the right path for the 21st century. They help us

implement our strategic plan and follow CNO's 2002 "Fight and Win" guidance to Navy leaders.

4. **Determine to faithfully do your best** - Faithfulness is the *sine qua non* of successful labor. God judges us not on our abilities, but on our faithfulness in doing our best in all we do. Faithful service brings honor to God, our nation, our faith groups, our families, and our Navy.

6. **Persevere through the seasons** - Perseverance enables us to accomplish more than we can ask or think. The good fruit of our labors will come in its season.
